Spoonfuls of joy

IRYMPLE South Primary School has stirred up a fresh idea to help brighten up the days of aged-care residents.

Students working onsite this week made art for the residents of Oasis Aged Care, including decorating wooden spoons to create the aged-care home's own little "Spoonville".

Spoonvilles are popping up in parks, lawns and nature strips across the world, featuring spoons decorated as characters of all kinds.

Art teacher Emma Lord found the Spoonville idea online and decided it would be a perfect way for students to bring joy to those hardest hit by the lockdown.

"We just thought we'd do something that wasn't about the kids – the kids were thinking of other people," Ms Lord said.

"It's important for the people who are in aged care, or anywhere where they're a bit more isolated, to know that other people are thinking of them, and not just their family, but also for the kids to realise that there are other people out there who are struggling as much as they are."

Grade 3 to 6 students created spoon villagers, while students from Prep to Grade 2 decorated butterflies to adorn the indoor areas at Oasis Aged Care.

With most students studying at home due to coronavirus measures, Irymple South Primary School is focusing on wellbeing as they work towards the end of Term 3.

"For some of our kids, the

whole lockdown thing is affecting them in other ways," Ms Lord said.

"We're trying to do a bit more of a wellbeing week this week, talking about gratefulness and kindness. This fitted in with that."

Ms Lord hoped the children's art would bring a smile to the home's residents.

"It's just something for them to look at, something a bit brighter.

"We had a bit of a smile at some of the butterflies the kids had drawn and the spoons they created."

VIRTUAL ZOO EXCURSION

On Wednesday the Grade 2 students participated in a virtual excursion at the Melbourne Zoo. There were a few technical difficulties but those who logged on enjoyed it. The students at school and at home participated. They learnt about the life cycles of animals: butterfly, Baw

Baw frog and the wallaby. The students at school also enjoyed watching the 'live' streaming of animals provided by Zoos Victoria. The giraffes were the favourite.
